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Geoffrey and Margaret Andrew Papers Ethel Wilson correspondence

Geoffrey and Margaret Andrew were close personal friends of Ethel Wilson during her later years. Geoffrey Andrew was Dean and Deputy President of the University of British Columbia from 1947 until he left to become executive director of the A.U.C.C. in Ottawa. During his period at U.B.C. he taught in the Department of English.

Margaret Andrew is the daughter of the principal, W. L. Grant, and granddaughter of George Grant, the distinguished president of Queen's University. She is a graduate in economics, social work and librarianship.

Both the Andrews have a lively interest in the creative arts and the culture of Canada. Their friendship with Ethel Wilson was a warm one and the correspondence when they were separated from her indicates their close ties.

Ethel Wilson, daughter of Robert William and Lila (Malkin) Bryant, was born at Port Elizabeth, South Africa in 1888. On the death of her mother in 1890 she was taken to England and cared for by maternal grand-parents and other relatives. Eight years later her father also passed away and once again she moved, this time to her grandmother in Vancouver, British Columbia. After receiving her Teacher's Certificate in 1907, Wilson taught at several Vancouver public schools until 1920. In 1921, she married Dr. Wallace Wilson. The Wilsons became highly respected and admired citizens, she for her writing and he for his work with the Canadian Medical Association and the World Health Organization.

It was not until 1937 that Wilson "found it imperative to write".

At that period, however, she was not a prolific writer. Aside from a few short stories, she produced very little work until 1947, when her first novel, Hetty Dorval, appeared. Her main period of productivity occurred during the next ten years, in which she wrote her other four novels,

The Innocent Traveller, The Equations of Love, Swamp Angel and Love and Salt Water and a small number of short stories. In 1961 her last published work, Mrs. Golightly and Other Stories, appeared; in the same year she was awarded a special medal by the Canada Council for her contribution to Canadian literature.

This collection of letters written by Ethel Wilson which was donated by the Andrews in 1981 will serve to fill out the existing Wilson collections in the Special Collections Division which were donated by Mrs. Wilson herself, and John Gray of MacMillans.

The collection consists of 33 original letters from Ethel Wilson to Margaret Andrew, undated, ca 1950 - 1970, 2 original letters from Ethel Wilson to [Margaret Andrew] n.d. and 3 original letters from Ethel Wilson to Geoffrey Andrew, n.d. Also included is one photocopied letter from Ethel Wilson to Mary [McAlpine Dobbs].
