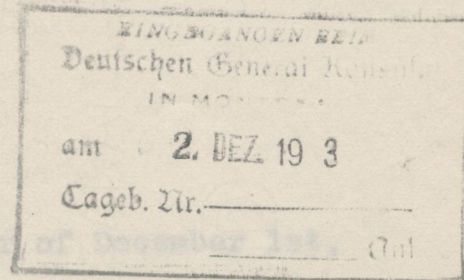

Dear Sir:

We made a shipment to Hamburg, Germany covering 4 Cases of waving machines which were originally exported to this country,

These machines were placed in the Bonded Warehouse in Toronto. The Canadian duty on this shipment was not paid and we returned same to the original shipper. We have now received a letter from our client advising us that it is necessary for the people in Germany to receive an Affidavit made out by the Canadian Customs authorities, that no duty had been paid on this merchandise and that it was not removed from the Government Bonded Warehouse while the merchandise was in Canada.

We might advise you at this time that we have made many shipments of a similar nature to Germany, but we were never called upon to obtain such an Affidavit.

We would request you to kindly advise us as to the exact wording of this Affidavit and whether same will be required to be certified by you. We would like to have this done correctly so that the people in Germany will not have any further difficulty in the clearing of this shipment.

We will, therefore, thank you for an early reply.

Dear Sirs,

I have your letter of December 1st, and would say that the situation, as described in the second paragraph of your letter, is undoubtedly a very unusual one, as ordinarily no special affidavit or other papers are required for return shipments to Germany.

I am unable to suggest the exact wording of the affidavit required from you, but I am inclined to think that an ordinary affidavit covering the facts of the matter as described in the letter from your clients in Germany would be sufficient. This affidavit should, in order to be legally valid, be made before a Notary Public and the Notary's signature legalized by this Consulate General. The fee for legalization amounts at present to \$3.35.
