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Fonds Description

Alan Chambers fonds. – 1972-1978 40 cm of textual materials.

Biographical Sketch

Alan D. Chambers was a graduate of U.B.C. and has had resource management experience with government and industry in both Ontario and British Columbia. In 1972, he took part in an analysis of natural resource policy in Canada for the Science Council of Canada. In the spring of 1972, he joined the U.B.C. Faculty of Forestry. He was also director of U.B.C.'s Resource Science Centre. He was involved as a consultant in three research projects: Study Coordinator of the Purcell Range Study, in 1973, under the authority of the Environment and Land Use Committee; participant in the Nazko-Kluskus First Nations Study in 1974; and Special Assistant to the Minister of Forests, in 1977-78 for an investigation into continuing struggle between logging interests and the Nazko-Kluskus First Nations.

On January 22, 1973, the Honourable Robert A. Williams, Minister of Lands, Forests and Water Resources for the B.C. government, requested a resource study of the Purcell Mountain area. The need for the study arose from two socio-economic conflicts surrounding preservation and developmental issues in the region. The first conflict was the needs of grazing cattle versus the protection of winter range essential for the survival of deer and elk. The second conflict was the needs of recreational land use versus timber production. The government then formed an inter-departmental Environment and Land Use Committee, comprised of ministers from the departments of Mines and Petroleum Resources, Recreation and Conservation, Agriculture, Health, and Highways and Municipal Affairs. The committee's mandate was to solve major environmental and resource management issues throughout the province, and to facilitate the flow of information, ideas and approaches between various departments in solving resource management and land allocation problems throughout the province.

In the spring of 1973, Chambers was hired by the Environment and Land Use Committee as Study Coordinator. His mandate was to direct a three-month interdepartmental study team to examine resource use in the Purcell Mountains. The region under study was a 7,500 square-mile area of the Purcell Mountains between Kootenay Lake in the west to the Columbia and Kootenay Rivers in the east, and from the U.S. border in the south to just north of Golden. Chambers' team was composed of 23 people from the following government departments: Lands, Forests and Water Resources; Recreation and Conservation; Mines and Petroleum Resources; Industrial Development; Trade and Commerce; Agriculture; and Highways. Also involved in the team was the B.C. Hydro and Power Authority. Through the process of compiling information and

holding public hearings, the team was to construct a rational and well integrated resource management plan for the region. Viable alternatives were to be presented in which all resource-based use potentials were recognized, and disputes in the area were resolved or minimized. On October 19, 1973, Chambers submitted his report entitled, "Purcell Range Study: Integrated Resource Management for British Columbia's Purcell Mountains." The report revealed that much of the region's forest land was overcommitted to logging, and that resource users were faced with drastic decisions. The main recommendation of the report was to set up an inter-departmental group that would be responsible for developing resource management plans for the region. The report was later criticized by Williams as being "not quite as factual or on target as possible."

In 1974, Chambers participated in the Nazko-Kluskus First Nations Study that was jointly commissioned by Nazko-Kluskus First Nations and the Department of Indian and Northern Affairs.

In 1977, Tom Waterland, Federal Minister of Forests, hired Chambers as a special assistant to develop a method for citizens to participate in resource planning for Carrier First Nations in the Nazko-Kluskus area. The impetus for the proposal was controversy and conflict over forest management policy and practices about logging in the area. The First Nations were attempting to halt proposed logging in Michelle Creek. Chambers resigned from the project on March 15, 1978.

Scope and Content

The records document Chambers' activities in three research projects that all attempt to reconcile the conflicts between preservation and development interests in resource management. The first project is documented extensively. The last two projects offer only a glimpse into the response of the Nazko-Kluskus First Nations to the issues raised in the Purcell study. These papers offer valuable evidence of the continuing conflict surrounding resource management and First Nations land claims in B.C., and Chambers role in attempting to find a resolution. There are three series of records that correspond to these three projects. Because original order has been lost, it has been reconstructed with reference to the functions and activities of each project. Files within each series have been arranged in chronological order. Undated documents have been placed at the back of each file.

Purcell Range Study series. - 1972-1974.

Series consists of correspondence, proposals, study summaries, reports, briefs, invoices, newspaper clippings, notes, maps and press releases pertaining to Chamber's role as Study Coordinator in the Purcell Range Study.

Nazko-Kluskus First Nations Study series. - 1973-1974.

3 cm of textual materials.

Series consists of correspondence, notes and reference reports pertaining to Chamber's involvement in the Nazko-Kluskus First Nations Study.

Ministry of Forests Study series. - 1974-1978.

6 cm of textual materials.

Series consists of correspondence, notes, newspaper clippings and reference reports pertaining to Chamber's role as Special Assistant to the Ministry of Forests in the 1977-78 investigation into the conflict between logging interests and the Nazko-Kluskus First Nations.
