Ha-sit-ston having been cautioned
and sworn states, I was in the house
when Kal-lat-seult was shot, I
heard the shot & ran towards the
place, it was quite dark, I found
Kal-lat-seult lying on the floor
within the house. Kal-lat-seult
told me that it was Phil-ha-lum
who had shot him. I then ran &
told the father of Kal-lat-seult
that his son was shot. I did not
see Phil-ha-lum in the house at the
time, but I heard him speak and say
"he was there and that he was not
so very drunk", Mut-tuts the
father of Kal-lat-seult then went
to where the body was lying and
carried it & put it on a bed.

Se-sy-ill-watt - Indian woman also wife of Relatscult having been cautioned & sworn states. I was out at the door when I heard a gun shot, I went in to the house and the father of my husband, brought my husband's body & laid it on the bed he died immediately I saw a gun shot wound on the body & also a stab with a knife on the shoulder The man Phil-ha-lum had gone to the

the woods where he staid five days,
after that he went away again to a
distance & staid a long time for the
purpose of being out of the way in
case he should be looked for,
since his return he has tried to settle
the matter with the friends of Kalatscutt
and has given thirty five blankets for
this purpose, the father of Kalatscutt
has got the blankets.

him in his care, that the friends
of Kalatscutt came to him some
time ago and said that it would
be very good to settle the matter with
some blankets and that shortly

after that he was told that Phil-
-ha-lum had given thirty five blankets
to settle it.

Mat-tuts, the father of Hal-lat-scutt
having been cautioned & sworn states
that on the evening of the murder I was
at my own house with Hal-lat-scutt
and my other son Ha-sit-ston. Ha-
-lat-scutt got up and went away to go to
the house of Phil-ha-lum and Ha-sit-
-ston followed him, immediately they
got to the house of Phil-ha-lum, I heard
the shot and Ha-sit-ston came
running back and said father your
son is shot. I got up and went to
the place, it was very dark, and I had
to search about and I found my son
Ha-lat-scutt lying on the floor
of Phil-ha-lum's house dying, I took
him up in my arms & carried him
to his bed, he died immediately.

Phil. Ra. lum must have been very angry with
him, and determined to kill him, as after
shooting him ^{he stabbed him} with the shoulder blade
with a knife. Immediately after the murder
Phil. Ra. lum took his wife & two children
and went off to the woods, and after stay-
-ing some days, he went further up the
country to be out of the way. In about two
months he sent one of his friends to see
if I would settle the matter with blankets,
I sent him word I would, and he sent me
fifty blankets, & about the first snow
he returned home when he thought no one
would be looking for him any more

been cautioned that anything he said
would be taken in evidence against
him, was asked if he had any state-
-ment to make. he replied that he
knew that he had done wrong, that it
was very bad to shoot his friend but
that he was drunk, and did not know
what he was doing, that his friend
Ral-lat-sealt was also drunk, &
that he, Phil-ha-lum, thought Ral-
-lat-sealt was going to shoot him,
& that he shot him to save himself.
