We have had mediation meetings the 27, 28, 31 of October and 3 November, 1975.

We are going through the unsettled proposals slowly so that the mediator can get an idea of what points are still at issue, and why each side of the table thinks they are at issue. The University has not changed their position on items such as Definition of Employees, Uhion Security, and other tender issues. However, we have reason to believe that some changes in those attitudes might be forthcoming, because the mediator has pointed out to the University that this is no longer the 11th Century, and that unions have been formed to provide justice and protection for employees and that it is high time that the University realized this.

There isn't really much else we can say, since we are re-reviewing at this point, but we all live in the sincere hope that once this stage

has been completed we will begin to make some progress.

Here is some news that may cheer you up a little. Barret has called a provincial election for December 11, 1975. The Legislature has been prorogued, probably until after Christmas. Only Price Control/Freeze Legislation was passed by an Order in Council, earlier in the fall. No parallel legislation has been enacted (i.e. parallel to the Federal Government Price and Wage Control - Bill C73). We are not covered under the Federal legislation. It may well be that we will not be affected in any way by the shole business. In light of this, we

will do our best to negotiate and bring back to you for approval an

3. BUSINESS ARISING FROM MINUTES:

Report on Wage and Price Controls Meeting (Heather McNeill)

BCTF representatives had gone to Ottawa to speak with the people who will be involved with the new bill (C173), which has not yet been passed and is only at its second reading. No definite interpretation of the regulations could be received and will not be known until it is passed. The provincial government has indicated that federal gidelines will be approved and the school trustees feel they are not able to offer any more than 8%. We could bargain for a greater amount and run the risk of having that rolled back if the university makes a successful complain after the bill is passed. Some unions are receiving wage proposals which contain no increase at all. It was felt that unions involved in bargaining at this time would get together informally to discuss what is happening to them. Another seeting is scheduled for 5 days following the passing of the bill or December 13, whichever comes first. She pointed out that at present no one is covered by any corrols.

Grievance Committee (Pat Gibson)

The university is refusing to process miss- and reclassifications because they say the contract has expired. The contract signed last year is still in effect. There is a meeting to be held on Friday, Nov. 14 and the matter discussed at that time.

A brief report was given stating that people are needed. A newsletter will be going out early next week and a work party being set up for Sunday afternoon.

Contract Committee

Frances reported on the wage and price control legislation. She had obtained the opinions of two Vancouver lawyers, Stu Rush and Ian Donald. Stu Rush supported the thought that we are in no way covered by this legislation as education is under provincial jurisdiction. There is also growing legal opinion that the legislation is unconstitutional. His strong recommendation was that we bargain energetically and earnestly as if the legislation did not exist because the province has not enacted any covering legislation. Ian Donald agreed with these comments and mentioned that there is little possibility that the provincial government will sit again until January.

Dale then reported on the state of negotiations. A meeting is scheduled for Friday. At the last meeting a grievance problem was raised, that concerning the halt in the processing of reclassifications and missclassifications. Although

the contract committee had told the mediator prior to the meeting that they did not wish to take time during negotiations to discuss a grievance matter, the whole morning was spent talking about it anyway. It has appeared at times as though the university is intentionally misunderstanding the union's proposals. It was felt that since there was no hammer to hold over Sims (the mediator) he had nothing with which to pressure the university. The meeting scheduled for Friday is supposed to finish up each side's presentations of their position on each article in the contract. After that each side in confidence will give the mediator their final position. The committee has stated quite strongly that they want a signed contract by the end of the month but to get that they must have a tool.
