INTRODUCTION

Bertrand William Sinclair (1881-1972), son of George Bertrand and Robina (Williamson) Sinclair was born in Edinburgh, Scotland and came to North America in 1889. Sinclair travelled extensively during his youth and spent about seven seasons as a range rider in Montana at the turn of the century. Sinclair began his writing career in 1902 and sold his first article to the San Francisco Argonaut. Following his own advice to another writer in 1908, "And so, if you would do the best that is in you, write of that which you know, whether it be the range, the stockyards, the schoolhouse, the city with its hurrying humans or the wilderness that lies naked in the sky," Sinclair continued to produce much fiction based on his ranching experience in Montana. After moving to Vancouver in 1912 Sinclair added to his subject material by turning to stories that were set within a British Columbian atmosphere and revolved around outdoor occupations such as fishing and logging. Pender Harbour became Sinclair's home base in 1922 as he continued to develop themes pertaining to the relationship of character to environment. Although Sinclair corresponded with his agent about the placement of stories with various publishers and film syndicates after the publication of his final novel in 1936, he devoted most of his later years to activites that conformed to his philosophy of life, including commercial fishing, rather than writing.

They were arranged according to the series stated in the table of contents. Sinclair kept together incoming and outgoing letters to correspondents and this order has been maintained. A division has been created between letters pertaining mainly to business matters, and those relating to his works by writers and the reading public as well as other matters concerned with his various interests and activities.

Although the papers referring to financial interests contained much correspondence with Jacques Chambrun, 1937-43, the majority of letters were written between 1920-25. There are letters about his novels published during the period, Poor Man's Rock, The Hidden Places, and The Inverted Pyramid, but many of the letters were concerned with his western stories. He was asked about "cowboy" life and some persons wrote about their "good old days" on the Montana range. Other letters referred to North of Fifty-Three and asked for information about northern portions of British Columbia. Also, correspondence between contemporary writers referred to the state of literature and writing in North America.

Bertrand Sinclair was a prolific writer. Many of his stories were not found among his papers in either manuscript or printed form. A list of printed material taken from his papers is located with the security copy of the inventory. The list is mainly a compilation of periodicals that reflected his reading interests.
