Dear Bir :-

With reference to your letter of September 11th. In my letter of September 10th. I stated that the 25, toms Tariff, was 8,50 M. per 100 kilos. I had based this statement on the Bill ... rate of duty on flour, according to the new German Custhis statement on the Bill which had been received here some time ago. I received to-day, however, copy of the Act as passed by the German Reichstag, and I see therefrom that the rate of duty on flour generally is 8 Marks, except in the case of flour made of noats, in which case it amounts to 10 Marks per 100 kilos.

> The rates here stated are exceptional rates in force until July 31st. 1926, when the ordinary rates of the German Customs Tariff will come into force. As far as I know there are not at the present time any countries enjoying preferential duties on flour entering Germany. In this respect a change may, however, take

place as soon as commercial treaties are concluded with individual foreign countries.
