

**INFORMATION.**

DISTRICT OF *Hawaii* to wit:—The information and complaint of "*Bill*"  
*Indian, Iuamichau Kibe* in the District of *Hawaii*  
 taken this *13<sup>th</sup>* day of *January* in the year of Our Lord one  
 thousand eight hundred and ~~88~~ *08* before me, *Wm. R. Spalding* one of Her  
 Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said District of *Hawaii* who, being sworn upon  
 his oath, saith that

On or about the *1<sup>st</sup>* of October 1807.  
 about *4 o'clock P. M.*, being <sup>*quite*</sup> drunk at the  
 time, a party of Indians who met at  
*Pepee Bay* commenced drinking, my Uncle,  
 by name *Kal-latsult* being amongst  
 them. After some time my Uncle's wife  
 disappeared, he went out to look for her,  
 and in the course of his search entered  
 the house of an Indian named *Phil-ha-*  
~~*lum*, he did not find her there, nor~~  
~~*Phil-ha-lum in the house*~~, Not finding  
 her there he called *Phil-ha-lum* by  
 name, who immediately answered that  
 he was there, at the same moment  
 discharging his musket at him. *Kal-*  
*lat-sult* fell wounded, when the  
 Indian *Phil-ha-lum* sprang upon  
 him and stabbed him with his knife.  
*Kal-lat-sult* did not die for some

time after he was wounded, and twice be-  
-fore he died, he told his brother named  
Ha-sit-ston that it was the ~~Indian~~  
Phil-ha-lum who had killed him
