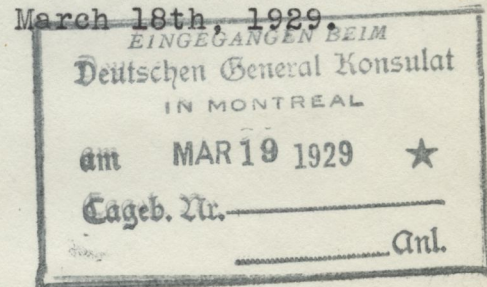


# THE CANADIAN NATIONAL EXHIBITION


