◀ MEET THE BOARD ▶

Tired of no food services, only 3 open washrooms, reduced library services, lack of laboratory and audio-visual equipment, no daycare, no bus service, cancelled classes and the general air of tension and depression on campus as this dispute drags on? So are the faculty. And the Administration.

Two weeks ago at a meeting of science faculty and Dr. Pederson, a motion of non-confidence in Dr. George Suart for his (mis)handling of AUCE 2 negotiations strategy was proposed, but ruled out of order by the Chair of that meeting.

Last week, the BOG received detailed reports from Dr. Pederson, Dr. Birch and Dr. Brown about the growing number of science, IDS and Arts faculty objecting to continued disruptions on campus and to the intransigence in the BOG's bargaining position. The suggestion was made that the BOG might reconsider its stance, such as by accepting unconditional binding arbitration, but the BOG refused.

The BOG has chosen to disregard the combined sentiments of visible widespread discontent evidenced by members of the academic community, both remaining on campus and those still respecting the picketline.

With the developments of the past week, it is clear SFU has a critical management problem. Some people who manage this institution seem to be less concerned with education and research, and more concerned with how the resolution of the wage settlement with AUCE 2 will affect other public sector and private sector wage settlements throughout BC. While members of the BOG insist on holding out in order to "bring the wages of AUCE 2 in line with the market for clerical and technical workers," the academic community is being forced to endure the inconveniences and disruptions on campus. As long as this continues, the BOG is being allowed to promote private and external interests within the University community, rather than manage University affairs on behalf of the academic community and so as to encourage and facilitate education and research.

(The difference between the BOG's last offer and AUCE 2's money demand is about \$75,000, or 5 day's wages for AUCE 2 staff. At UBC, the University just agreed to a 7% increase for a one year contract with clerical and technical staff there.)

SHOULD WE CONTINUE TO ALLOW THIS PRINCIPLE TO REMAIN PARAMOUNT IN PROLONGING THIS DISPUTE AT THE EXPENSE OF EDUCATION AT SFU?

CALL THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS MEMBERS YOURSELF.....TELL THEM WE'VE HAD ENOUGH! ! !
