Between Wah Jung - Plaintiff

Loy Gow - Defendant

I Wah Jung of the City of Victoria in the Province of British Columbia, Cook, make oath and say.

That the defendant is a married woman and that her husband's name is Chin Yin

That the defendant carries on the business of washing and ironing on her own account free from the control and separate from her husband.

That the defendant is justly and truly indebted to me in the sum of One hundred and twenty dollars for money lent by me to the defendant in the month of June last.

That the defendant resides and carries on business as aforesaid in the City of Victoria aforesaid.

A. W. H. That I have been informed that by Hee Gee of Yates Street Victoria aforesaid washerman

A. W. H. ^{informed him that she} that the defendant is about to quit Victoria and this Province and go to the United States

of America.

That I was further informed by the
said Hee Lee

that the defendant will leave this City
for Washington Territory to-morrow on
the Steamer Isabel.

That I have frequently applied to
the defendant for payment of the said
sum of One hundred and twenty dollars
but she has refused to pay the same.

For the reasons aforesaid I verily
believe that the said defendant Looy Goo
is about to quit British Columbia unless
she be forthwith apprehended.

I have caused a writ of summons to be
sued out of this Honorable Court in this
action at my suit against the above
named defendant.

Sworn before me at
Victoria this 20th day of
September A.D. 1877 the
contents of the above affidavit
having been first read over and
explained to him in the Chinese
language by John Ah Chook of
Victoria City who was first duly
sworn to interpret the same.
