To Collectors of Customs and Excise,
and others concerned:

AGE CERTIFICATES FOR IMPORTED WHISKEY

No intoxicating liquor, commonly known as whiskey, may be imported or admitted to entry into Canada, unless such whiskey has been manufactured for at least two years, and has been duly certificated respecting the date of manufacture by authorized officers of the Government of the country in which produced:- O.C. (P.C. 1761,) dated 19th November, 1926, as amended by O.C.(P.C. 2076,) dated 5th January, 1927, and O.C. (P.C. 230) dated 12th February, 1927.

No intoxicating liquor, commonly known as whiskey, bearing on the bottles or other containers thereof statements as to age of the whiskey, may be imported or admitted to entry into Canada, unless such statement as to date of manufacture has been certificated by authorized officers of the Government of the country in which produced:- O.C (P.C. 18) dated 8th January, 1932.
