of twenty two dollars and upwards, also
one coil of rope of the value of two dollars
and upwards the property of the said
Nichol George against the peace of our Lady the Queen
her Crown and dignity.

THE INFORMATION AND COMPLAINT of *Leigh Webb, Mr. Mullany*
of *Victoria*, taken this *11. day of April*
1871, before the undersigned, one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace in and for the said Colony
of British Columbia and its Dependencies, who, being duly sworn, upon oath deposeth saith:—

About August or September 1868 a free
fisherman named Nickel George went to
Cushian and never returned. There is suspicion
that he was murdered. A gold watch the
property of Nickel George was traced to the
possession of the Premier *dua*. *dua* who was
arrested a few months subsequently on the
charge of being concerned with murder of
Nickel George but was eventually discharged.
From information recently received I went to
Guamish yesterday and arrested the
Premier. I charge the Premier with being
concerned with the murder of the said Nickel
George on or about the 20th October 1868.

of *Victoria*, taken this *9th* day of *May*
1871, before the undersigned, one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace in and for the said Colony
of British Columbia and its Dependencies, who, being duly sworn, upon oath deposeth saith:—

That August or September 1868 a freed
Negro named *Nickel George* went to
Comox and never returned. There is
suspicion that he was murdered. From
information received went to Qualicum
and arrested the *Pasqua Helleah* alias
Hawley on Sunday last. Charged the
Pasqua ^{with} on suspicion of being concerned in
the murder of the aforesaid *Nickel George*
in company with the *Pasqua Quashaw*
on about the 20th October 1868.

1871, before the undersigned, one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace in and for the said Colony
of British Columbia and its Dependencies, who, being duly sworn, upon oath deposeth saith:—

I am informed I received a charge
from the Prisoner *Isaac Whalen* and
he left with stealing 2 bags of flour
of the value of \$2²⁵ each, one barrel
of the value of \$22 and upwards and
one coil rope of the value of \$2⁰⁰ and
upwards the property of one *John*
George a fisherman about the
month of October 1868.

Sucksackaluck a Skeneew
Indian longduly cautioned
states.

About three years ago the prisoner Helleah alias Harry in company with the prisoner Zua-whau and his wife were in a canoe at a small island near Salt Spring. It was a foggy day - they shouted out and the fisherman who was on shore answered them - they went on shore to the fisherman and Zua-whau shot the fisherman first but did not kill him - the fisherman started to run towards his boat and then the prisoner Helleah shot him and he fell dead on the beach close to the boat. Zua-whau and ~~the~~ Helleah then cut a piece off the painter of the fisherman's boat and tied one end round the fisherman's neck and the other end round a large rock and took the body into the deep water and sunk it - what I have stated was told to me by Shilhalum in my house -

Shilhalum was sitting on the floor cutting tobacco with a knife when Helleah went up to him and snatched the knife from him. They had a struggle and Shilhalum threatened Helleah that if he did not stop that he would tell the magistrate about his having killed the policeman. After that Helleah went and got his musket and shot a clockman after shooting the clockman Helleah went off in this case.

I shot you in the shoulder but the shots were very small.
I did shoot your brother too.
I thought the clockman you shot at was dead which is the reason why I shot at you and your brother.
The clockman was my wife and I shot at you on the impulse of the moment.

About 3 months and a half ago
I was at a place called Sustamew
in a house where the prisoner
Helleah was, also his brother, his
mother, and Sucksaekalukk, two
coachmen, two old men and two
boys, and Shilthalam -

In the evening Sucksaekalukk's
coachman commenced to beat
them with whisky. a little before
midnight they began to get angry.
the prisoner Helleah's brother
attempted to cut Sucksaekalukk's
sister with a knife - In the
morning there was a fight and
Helleah wanted to fight with
Shilthalam - Shilthalam told
Helleah to look out or else he would
tell the Tahee how he (Helleah)
had killed the fishermen in
company with Zua-whaew. When
Shilthalam said this Helleah
replied yes, if you are going to
tell the Tahee I will kill you
today and he went into the house
and got his musket and shot

carrying in my chuse a white man
named Louis who lives at Methow.
I met the Prisoner Tua-whaen and
and Halock another Indian.
Tua-whaen had a good pistol with
six barrels. Halock told me that
if I did not turn back he would
shoot the white man and that
if I had not been there he would
have shot the white man any
how. Tua-whaen, Halock and
another Indian who was also
present had only one pistol
among them.

Susan a Comanche Indian
being duly cautioned states

One morning about two years ~~ago~~
and a half ago the two Prisoners
Zua-whaen and Hellah and
Zua-whaen's Clockman arrived
at Clemclemity in a canoe. In
the canoe I saw the sail of a boat,
a rope that the fishermen use
for hauling nets, and two sacks
of flour! I asked them where
they came from, they said from
Victoria - I asked them where
they got the sail and rope and
they said they stole them from
a fisherman - Zua-whaen's Clockman
gave me some of the flour - This
is all I know.

but quite three years ago I was
at Clennelby - early one
morning the Passers Zaa-whew,
and Hellah came there in a
canoe accompanied by Zaa-whew's
cloochee - I saw in the canoe, a
boat sail, a coil of rope, and two
sacks of flour. I asked the Passers
where they had got the things and
Zaa-whew replied, that, they
had stolen them from a fisherman -
The sail was ^{large} a boat sail and not
a canoe sail -

I know the bold wight produced,
my man Hugh George used to wear
it in his breast - Hugh George
was a fisherman - He went to Victoria
and remained at Cowichan being
sick. I kept him back at
Cowichan all the time, but he
never came - When the canoe arrived
He hastened at Clennelby with
the Passers, there were present Susan
and her widow and ~~the wight~~.

It was a coil of rope of considerable
size coiled up in the stem of the
