Sir:

I would greatly appreciate if you would procure for me the following information in connection with a motor boat trip which I am taking through the inland waters of Europe, early in the Spring. I intend to pass through Germany on the following route:

Coming from the North Sea and proceeding on the Rhine up to Lake Constance in Switzerland. Coming back on the Elbe to Hamburg, Kiel Canal and back on the Oder. I believe that Berlin is approachable either form the Elbe or from the Oder, also that the rivers are nayigable all the way through.

I would appreciate any detailed information you may be able to give me, as well as any maps or charts you you can procure from the department of waterways.

The boat has about six inches or at the most one foot of draft and is about twenty-two feet long.

The trip will at the same time follow some commercial objectives in connection with American boating industry. Perhaps you will be able to give ma also information on the following:

What duty is charged in Germany

(a) on motor boats U.S.A. provenience with inbuilt gasoline engines.

(b) on runabouts and small cruisers up to fifty feet and O.A.L.

(c) on boats without engines, especially small outboards.

(d) on marine engines and outboard motors if sold without boats.

What formalities are necessary to pass through your country with a foreign boat?

If I am taking the liberty to trouble you to such an extent, I hope that on the other hand my trip may serve to attract public attention to the feasibility of international water travel through your country. The description of the trip will be published in a large number of leading magazines in several languages.
