feloniously wilfully and of his
malice aforethought did make
an assault, and that the said
Dick a certain Gun then and there
loaded and charged with Gunpowder
and divers, to wit, two leaden
bulletts which Gun he the said
Dick in his hand then and
there had and held to against
and upon the said Wakeekos then
and there feloniously wilfully and
of his malice aforethought did
shoot and discharge, and that
the said Dick with the leaden
bulletts ^{aforesaid} out of the Gun aforesaid,
then and there by force of the
Gunpowder shot and sent forth
as aforesaid, the said Wakeekos

in and upon the back of him
the said Wakeekos, then and there
feloniously wilfully and of his
malice aforethought did strike
penetrate and wound giving to
the said Wakeekos then and
there with the leaden bullets
aforesaid so as aforesaid shot,
discharged and sentforth out of
the gun aforesaid by the said
Dick in and upon the back of
him the said Wakeekos one
wound of which said wound
the said Wakeekos did die and
so the jurors aforesaid upon their
Oath aforesaid do say that the
the said Wakeekos
said Dick in manner and
form

from aforesaid feloniously wilfully
and of his malice aforethought
did kill and Murder against
the Peace of our Lady The Queen
Her Crown and Dignity
