Greenwood Finds No Pessimism

Dominion Needs Unifying Influence, Says Titled Canadian

Toronto, Sept. 3—(C.P.)—There is no pessimism in England about the future of the Dominions, Viscount Greenwood, chairman of the British Iron and Steel Federation, assured Canadian National Exhibition directors today at the manufacturers' day luncheon. He spoke after a formal address by W. D. Black, president of the Canadian Manufacturers Association.

In his recent trip to Western Canada Viscount Greenwood said he was surprised to find instances of pessimism among

the residents.

The Viscount, a native of Whitby, Ont., and first overseas man to be made a viscount, said he recalled as a boy how his family was "regimented and marched to this exhibition" by his father.

Speaking "as a manufacturer" helesaid the exhibition deserved the congratulations of Canada and offerevery other country for its contributions to Empire and to progress. He saw in the exhibition a unifying influence for Canadans: "And if there is one thing Canada needs it is a unifying influence."

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He referred to the visit of Lord Stanley, the British Dominions Secretary who opened the fair last week, and to forthcoming visits of Lord Elgin and Lord Dudleigh, who heads the delegation of iron and steel men to a world conference in New York. Lord Dudleigh will bring all his delegates to Canada before the conference.

Will Open Fair

Lord Elgin is to open the Royal
