Mit Beziehung auf meinen Bericht J.Nr.: H.A.940 vom 17. November d.J. beehre ich mich mitzuteilen, dass einer Zeitungsmeldung im "Toronto Daily Star" vom 22. November zufolge der Kolonialwarenhändlerverband in Toronto, dessen Mitglieder juedische Kaufleute sind, beschlossen hat, deutsche und italienische Waren zu boykottieren. Ferner hat nach einem Artikel in der "Gazette", Montreal, vom gleichen Tage der Kommunistische Deutsch-Kanadische Volksbund in Kitchener (frueher Berlin), Ontario, die Kanadische Regierung zur Einschraenkung der Handelsbeziehungen mit Deutschland aufgefordert, "solange Deutschland nicht vernuenftiger und menschlicher regiert werde." Beiden Entschliessungen duerfte vorlaeufig keine weittragendere Bedeutung beizumessen sein.

## GERMAN-CANADIANS URGE NAZI BOYCOTT

### Kitchener Meeting Denounces 'Barbarous' Treatment of Jews in Reich

Kitchener, Ont., November 21.—  
(P)—More than 100 members of the German-Canadian Peoples' Society tonight denounced the Government of their native land and asked Canadian authorities to place an embargo on trade with Germany. Kitchener, formerly Berlin, has a large population of German extraction.

Following several addresses in German and English, the meeting unanimously decided in a resolution to urge the Dominion Government to make known to the Nazi regime that the German-born people in Canada are opposed to the "barbarous occurrences of the past two weeks," in connection with "brutal treatment to which the Jews of Germany are being subjected."

The resolution was addressed to Prime Minister Mackenzie King. It appealed for trade restrictions in the interests of world peace "until that land is governed by a sane and humane government."

Chairman George Imhof said the treatment of Jews in Germany is a blot upon civilization. Paul Bender warned against Nazi propaganda in Canada. H. Hughes, representing the Trades and Labor Council, urged an economic boycott of German goods. The suggestion was greeted with applause.
