on the 3rd July about dusk I saw the
deceased woman Mary and the Prisoner
at her house together - the Prisoner
did not stop there long. I saw him come
out. I saw him when he climbed
~~up~~ angry. ~~I heard no noise in the~~
~~house~~ - though I was not very far from
it. In the house. I heard a noise in
the house as though they were fighting
When the prisoner left I went into the
house. I saw the deceased sitting down
on a chair she looked sick and said
that the Prisoner Billy had kicked her
in the head & side and that she thought
she might die poor it. Mary was a
sickly woman but she was able to
about and work.

Next morning I heard of Mary's death

On Monday 3rd July. Mrs. the deceased

morning she thought she might die
from the effects of the blows. She

I am a duly qualified Surgeon having
received my diploma in Glasgow

On the 24th July 1871 I was requested
by Mr Pope to make a post mortem
examination of the body of an Indian
woman named Mary - I examined
the body - but was unable from
the absence of instruments to open
the body.

I found a contusion on the crown
of the head about 3 inches in circumference
I opened the contusion and found
congested blood underneath - the
skin was severely broken - I do not
think the ~~so~~ bone was caused
by a fall it must have been done
by blunt instrument - there was no
fracture of the bones anywhere - I
knew Mary - she was not a strong
woman nor was she healthy - she
was diseased all over

Sath:

On the morning of 20th July
a little after 5 am. an Indian named
Joe. came to me and told me
that there was an Indian
woman named Mary. dead in
her house. I immediately
went to the house and found
her lying on the floor dead.
From information I received
I assumed it prisoner on
charge of murdering her. The
prisoner made no resistance - he
distrusted our boy & pension
that he had had a quarrel
with Mary and had beaten
her.

being severally examined in his presence, the said

is now addressed by me as follows:—

"Having heard the evidence, do you wish to say anything in answer to the charge? You are not obliged to say anything unless you desire to do so; but whatever you say will be taken down in writing, and may be given in evidence against you upon your trial. You have nothing to hope from any promise of favour, and nothing to fear from any threat, which may have been holden out to you to induce you to make any admission or confession of your guilt, but whatever you shall now say may be given in evidence against you upon your trial, notwithstanding such promise or threat." Whereupon the said

Billy saith as follows:—

I came down from above and
the women told me that two
men have been with my woman
Mary. Since I had been away
I was at the house and enquired
if she was ~~then~~ better she said
no and wished me to stay with
her. I offered her physic from Dr
Dr. Jones she said no it always
make her sick. I went out
sat down near the Blacksmith's
shop when I saw a Indian
Indian enter deceased's house
and say there about an hour
I then went at the house and
asked her who the Indian
brought there - She would not
answer. I then accused her
of sleeping with the Indian she
made no answer I then
became angry and kicked her
she was sitting on the box. I
did not ~~not~~ strike her
