





### NOTE 1: Accounting Policies

Fixed assets are not capitalized but are recorded as expenditures of the year they are acquired.

## NOTE 2: Revenue

The revenue of the Association is derived from a per capita tax of two dollars per full-time member per month and twenty-five percent of dues collected for other than full-time members.

#### SFU 18 DEFENCE COMMITTEE REPORT TO 1980 AUCE PROVINCIAL CONVENTION

Submitted by: Bill Burgess

Press Statement, April 18, 1980.

Over a year ago, the RCMP violently dragged us off the legal picket line of a union defending basic rights.

We've been prosecuted on serious criminal charges at great public expense despite the demands to drop all the charges from the entire labour movement, students' and women's organizations and the BC NDP.

We've faced months of the harassment and intimidation of individual trials when one common trial was possible.

We've won against 27 of the original 36 charges against 18 picketers. Nine of us have been found guilty of obstructing a highway, three have been fined \$250, and the others have been given conditional discharges.

Our defence has cost over \$25,000 and we are still about \$10,000 in debt.

We consider that this has been a clear-cut attack on worker's right to strike.

Hundreds joined the AUCE 2 picket line to win a decent negotiated settlement; to fight to implement the Human Rights Act provision for equal pay for work of equal value; and, to defend high quality and accessible education.

Picketers acted upon their well established understanding of strikers' rights to picket the entrance to their employer's place of business. Without any warning or court order, they were violently removed on orders of RCMP Labour Liaison Committee officers.

Trial evidence has shown that the police strategy to deal with the mass picketing was to leave picketers in increasing personal jeopardy from reckless motorists. Police even selected motorists who were encouraged to try to "crash through the line", in hopes that picketers would "run for their lives".

The trial decisions have set unfavourable precedents for workers. Obstruction was defined as even hindering or slowing traffic. Individual picketers were found to be principals in any obstruction, whether or not they were personally involved or even on the picket line at that particular time. No warning that police considered picketers' actions to be illegal was considered necessary. No recognition of any rights except those of motorists was granted.

We feel that our defence campaign has been a success. We've been acquitted on most of the charges. Sentences for the guilty decisions have been mild, We've received support and donations for defence expenses from the trade union movement and students' and women's organizations. Our defence campaign has shown that it is imperative to defend ourselves against attacks on our rights. We have also shown that it is possible to do so.

- That the BCSF and local student associations pressure the Ministry 3. of Education to give allowances for possible wage increases in the budgets it gives to post-secondary institutions.

Workshop on Student Rights and Responsibilities

Motions to go forward to the closing plenary

- Be it resolved that BCSF strike a committee to construct a 1. Student Bill of Rights and Responsibilities.
- Whereas guidelines are essential in dealing with a task of this 2. magnitude, be it resolved that the committee will
  - deal with both rights and responsibilities of students a)
  - conduct a provincial information gathering (i.e. letters, b) cauceses meetings etc.)
  - c) B.C. delegates to the NUS conference co-ordinate, through the B.C. caucus, information gathering for the construction of a Bill of Rights and Responsibilities.
  - local campuses be encouraged to supply input as to the direction d) of this document.
  - a draft bill be prepared for presentation at the Fall conference e)
  - a paper be prepared for a workshop on Student Rights and f) Responsibilities at the fall conference

#### Women's Caucus

Discussed were Women's Centres, Child Care (lack of), Sexual Harassment, Abortion, and the formation of a steering committee for the BCSF's Women's Caucus, a day of action was suggested where children would come onto participating campuses to demonstrate a need that is not being addressed.

### Vocational Issues Workshop

Motions coming forward:

Be it resolved that BCSF recognize the problems of vocational students that are especially critical given the structure of vocational training programs.

Be it resolved that BCSF recognize the order of priority in which these concerns affect vocational students which is 1. daycare, 2. financial aid, 3. housing, 4. coordination of the programs on a provincial level, 5. occupational and course counselling.

Be it further resolved that vocational institutes, colleges and universities coordinate their efforts on the housing problem.

#### Women's Issues Workshop (Paper included)

Motions coming forward:

- 1. That BCSF integrate into its campaign specific problems faced by women as a result of inadequacies within the current student loan plan and that this work be coordinated by the women's steering committee.
- Whereas women are an integral and non-distinguishable part of BCSF, be it resolved that if a Women's Protest Day happens that BCSF by the responsible sponsor of said protest.
- 3. That the women's issues workshop recommends to the plenary that the Declaration of the Right of the Woman Student be adopted as BCSF policy and that the following pre-amble be included: Whereas BCSF recognizes that students face problems common to either sex, it also recognizes that women, more than men are subject to



discrimination, stereotyping, lack of access to education and to information pertaining to birth control. BCSF accepts the declaration of the Rights of the Woman Student as a statement of the particular concerns of women, but recognizes that many of the problems addressed are not unique to women, but in many cases specific to women.

Youth Employment Workshop - discussion paper attached.
