Reich to Bring Noted Island Under Customs Territory

Although the isle has belonged to Germany since 1890, when it was ceded by Great Britain in exchange for Zanzibar, off the East African coast, no customs were levied on foreign goods entering it. Expensive foreign delicacies of every variety could be obtained there at prices unheard of in the Reich. Tourists made it a chosen spot.
