taken on oath on the 28th February
1871 and until 6th March 1871 - of
Kum Shin, Inspector Low Broder
and Ah Horn taken on oath on
the 6th March 1871 before the
undersigned one of Her Majesty's
Justices of the Peace for the Colony
aforesaid with present and
hearing of Ah Lam and Ah Lou
who are charged this day before
me for that they the said Ah Lam
and Ah Lou on Friday the 10th February
1871 in a Restaurant kept by
Chuck Wong in Compton Street
Victoria within Colony aforesaid
unlawfully and in a tumultuous
manner and with force and arms did
make an affray, & the said and disturbance
of Her Majesty's Subjects then being there:
the said Ah Lam was assaulted beaten and
abused by the said Ah Lou and the said
Ah Lou was assaulted beaten and
abused by the said Ah Lam without any
just or reasonable cause against the peace of
the said the Queen her crown and
dignity.

INFORMATION.

COLONY OF BRITISH COLUMBIA
AND ITS DEPENDENCIES.
To Wit.

THE INFORMATION AND COMPLAINT of *Serj. Robert McMillan*
of *Victoria*, taken this *28th* day of *February*
1871, before the undersigned, one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace in and for the said Colony
of British Columbia and its Dependencies, who, being duly sworn, upon oath deposeth saith:—

On the afternoon of Friday the 10th February 1871
went ashore in Cormorant Street, Victoria
where I saw two Chinese named Ah Sam and
Ah Sin badly wounded; and I learned the
said Ah Sam and Ah Sin from that they
unlawfully and in a tumultuous manner
and with force and arms did make an affray
on the 10th inst. in a Restaurant kept by
Chuck Hoow (a Chinese) in Cormorant
Street, Victoria with Colony aforesaid & the
town and disturbance of Her Majesty's
subjects there being wherein the said Ah Sam
was assaulted beaten and abused by the said
Ah Sin and wherein the said Ah Sin was
assaulted beaten and abused by the said
Ah Sam against the Queen of the Lady the
Queen her Crown & dignity.
