Dear Sirs:

In reply to your letter of October 7th - ASC/VS - I beg to say that no special forms or papers are required for returned goods shipped to Germany.

It is up to the German consignee to prove to the satisfaction of the German Customs Authorities that the goods in question are actually returned goods. It might, however, be helpful
to your correspondent in Germany, if you swore out an affidavit
to the effect that the machinery shipped to your correspondent in
Germany is that described in the original invoice, attached to the
affidavit. The affidavit could be sworn before a notary public
whose signature in turn could be legalized by this Consulate
General. The fee for such legalization would be \$2.65.

Let me repeat that this procedure is not essential, although designed to facilitate matters for the German consignee when clearing his goods through the customs.
