DOCUMENTATION FOR GERMANY.

I take the liberty of bringing to your attention a question submitted to me by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, Toronto. They ask if there is any form of certificate of origin required on invoices of Canadian goods when shipped into Germany under the new Trade Agreement.

I have for guidance the information you were kind enough to furnish to the Department of External Affairs under date of January 3, on this subject and which we published in the last issue of our Commercial Intelligence Journal.

I think the problem before the Canadian Manufacturers' Association is whether there is any particular wording to be used in making the declaration of origin as some countries are rather exacting on this point. I have suggested that it would suffice to state the country of origin on the invoice for example, "made in Canada" or "produced in Canada", and would be very much indebted to you if you would give me your views on this point.
