Dear Sirs:

In reply to your inquiry of November 30th I beg to say that this Consulate General is prevented by existing regulations from giving authentic information on German customs matters. I would suggest that you direct your inquiry accompanied by samples to the Canadian Trade Commissioner, L.D. Wilgress, Hamburg 36, Neurr-Wall 10, who is in a position to obtain complete information from the competent German customs authorities.

Without obligation I would say that celluloid waste is dutyfree in Germany. Whether the material you intend to ship will be classified as waste, is beyond my knowledge. Two German Lines ship out of Montreal to Hamburg, vis:

1) North German Lloyd, represented by the Robert Reford Co. 230 Hospital Street, Montreal.

2) The Hamburg-America Line, represented by the Canada Steamship Lines. Montreal.
