Dear Sir, <u>re Documentation for Germany</u> In reply to your letter of January 30th, -file Nr.25011-A - I beg to say that all the official information which I have received from My Government on the subject of proof of origin for Canadian goods shipped into Germany is contained in my letter to the Department of External Affairs under date of January 3rd.

As far as I am aware, there *musticular* is no particular wording to be used in making the declaration of origin. I have reason to believe that invoices showing name and address of sender and consignee; number of packages; kind of packages; mark, and numbers; weight-gross and net; transportation used (rail, mail_ship etc.); contents of packages, and bearing the the following declaration:

> "I herewith certify that the above goods are of Canadian origin"

will be acceptable to the German Customs authorities.
