Dear Madam:

Your enquiry of the 20th inst., addressed to the German Consulate at Toronto, has been forwarded to me for attention as there is no German Consulate at Toronto. I am sorry not to be in a position to supply you with literature concerning Christmas mail to Germany. I beg to say however, that all Christmas gifts are dutiable in Germany and the duty depends upon the nature of the goods shipped and the weight.

In case you intend to prepay the duty, I would suggest that you get in touch with Mr. G. C. Szenkovits, German Shipping Agent, Board of Trade Bldg., Montreal, who will undoubtedly be in a position to advise you.
