THE EXAMINATION of *Thomas D Lindsay* — , of
Twentieth — day of *December* , in the year of Our Lord One
 Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighty- *two* , at Victoria, in the Province aforesaid, before the
 undersigned, *one* of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said Province, in the presence and
 hearing of *Ki' Chew, and Ah On* — who ^{are} this day
 charged before me, ~~for that he, the said~~

This Deponent, *Tho. D Lindsay* , upon his
 oath deposeth, and saith as follows:

*I have heard my information read
 and it is true, and I see the persons I charge
 in Court.*

*This morning about 5 minutes to
 5 o'clock, whilst in the act of making up the*

Chinese Cook at the New England Bakery. I heard a disturbance among some Chinese men, and I saw one shouting and jumping exceedingly at the corner of Government and Johnson Streets. I hurried to where he was, and from information I received, I went to Pow Kee's over Government Street, and I was there told that Pow Kee had been robbed of \$400. I went down stairs to the lower floor, and I found the Box (now in Court, under the abounding building to Pow Kee's). The top of the box was freshly broken open, and I saw a pair of Chinese shoes laying close to the box, I saw 2 plank about 10 feet long, portions of the house, knocked from the end of the building - I returned quickly to Government Street, and from there to Long Lee's building on Cravat and Street, and I heard a noise in the Ravine as if some person was scampering, I also heard a dog bark. I attempted to get into the Ravine by Morelys Blacksmith shop and whilst there I heard a Chinaman shout "two men run" I ran quickly to Government Street, and I could see at the crooking of Government and Cravat Street faintly a Chinaman. The fellow was running, & I followed after him, when I got to the Prince of Wales Saloon I distinctly ~~saw~~ the two objects at Long Hons Store, I chased

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They were running I chased them, and I lost sight of them in a moment, I ran on to the corner of Douglas & Cormorant Streets, entered several Chinese houses (where I saw a light), and finally I came to an alley between Government and Douglas Street, on Cormorant Street, and I saw a faint light through the window of the cabin I approached cautiously, and I saw the two prisoners now in the dock in the said cabin, I saw one of them ^{Ki-chew} sitting in a bed or bunk about eight high from the floor he had his back to me & was leaning over as if he was counting something the other one was standing on the floor putting on a pair of slippers - He immediately opened the door and came out and I stepped in, and the person I call who I hear call himself Ki-chew, dropped the pants produced on the bed and partially covered them up I reached and up got the pants let them fall on the table, and as they dropped ^{on the table} I heard something fall, as if it was heavy ^{and a side of money}, I fell in the pocket & I found the purse & money produced, amounting to \$400 ⁰⁰ in gold coin, purse is marked "A" The other man, who I hear him call himself Ah On I waited for him, until he came in, he asked me in English & very saucily, "what brought me there?" I stepped in the doorway & got between him and the door (he on the inside of the house) and I said I'll take this money, he said ^{and I drew my pistol} They talk'd Chinese every exchequely to each other " and Ah On said the money belonged to the other man ^{Ki-chew} and that he got it from Portland

I had my uniform Coat & Badge on at the time, and I told them that I was going to arrest them. I threw my great Coat off because I expected resistance -

There was another Chinaman in (the house before spoken of) his name is Ah Poo. I ~~threw~~ they quieted down, and I stepped to the door & blew my whistle and officers McLeod, and Welsh came to my assistance and we arrested the prisoners and took them to Goal;

In the pocket of the Paul's I found some fresh clay, a live Earth worm, a Key, and some pieces of Chinese paper a dirty handkerchief. The Paul's had wet mud on them at the time named ~~Wong~~ The Ground outside was muddy -

There was also a Chinese Coat which was muddied and wet, ^{there was} I also picked up a pair of Chinese Shoes, which were wet also and another pair of Carpet slippers which were very wet; - There was also in the pocket of the Paul 4 quarters (doll.) 3 shirt Bills, and one Bogus Coin. These were carefully wrapped up in a piece of paper.

The Blouse of the prisoner Ki Shoo had spots of damp mud or clay on them.

The prisoner Ah On said that he had been up to Cook his breakfast.

The 2 planks above named were freshly taken off When said planks are off
acep ^{the underneath} can be gained to all those buildings

I found a portion of the lid of the box named chopped off, & I found it in the hinge of it broken - it was in the same condition as now produced.

The (Third) ^{day too} Epunaman was in bed and when he arrived at Gaol he told me that a short time before I arrived at the house he heard somebody come into the house: and he said Ah Da cooked supper at 12 o'clock It was a little after (about 10 or 15 minutes past 5 o'clock am when the prisoners were arrested

I saw the pants

When Ki Chen was arrested he had no pants on.

When the money pants dropped on the table I think the fence was open, and I took the fence and money and put it in my pocket. I counted the money at the jail and it amounted to \$400/-

I examined the premises where the robbery took place, where I found the box produced.

I wish to correct a former statement. I then stated that there was no partition in cellar between Pow Kee House and the adjoining premises where the box was found, on examination I found that there is a partition. There was a doorway in said partition but it was nailed up previous to the robbery, I found on examination that the nails had been broken that fastened said door, and that the door was busted out. The door was not on hinges.

I found the key produced I wish to state in addition to the evidence I gave the other day, "that I found the key produced marked "B" in the pocket of the pants produced in Court on the 20th Inst. Said pants were in possession of Ki Chow.

I found the said key at the same time I found the money. The said key opens the lock of the door that leads into Pow Kee's front shop from the stair entrance from the cellar beneath Pow Kee house — I fitted said key to said door —

Dev. 27th 1882

This morning
Ki Shaw tried the pair of shoes
marked "C" on, produced in Court
and they fitted him exactly -

Ah On tried on the other pair
marked "D" and they seemed to fit him
very well, they were a little more worn
than the others Ah On remarked
when he put the shoes on, "that he never
wore Chinese Shoes":

The door In order to get into
Poo Kees house It was necessary to break
open the door I noticed said door
had been broken open immediately I
left the Police Court after giving my evidence

I live at Paw Kees Shop - I remember a robbery on Wednesday morning near two weeks ago.

it was about 4 O'clock in the morning
I heard a noise on the stairs and
woke up I got up and lit a
match, I saw the back door open
and I went and woke up Pow Kee
and I lighted the lamp, and I saw
that the trunk was gone, myself &
Pow Kee then went into the ^{cellar} ~~cellar~~
together and I saw the trunk, in
the cellar of the next house, (houseman)
I also saw 2 pair of Chinese Shoes,
along side said trunk, The Trunk
when I saw it was broken open
Pow Kee felt for the money in the drawer
of the trunk and he found it gone
and he told me that he had had \$400
in the trunk - When I have no work
at other places I stay with Pow Kee,
and on the night in question I was
sleeping in Pow Kee's Store.

There was a ^{cellars of the} partition between
the two houses of the two houses, and a
door in that partition which was nailed
up but when I went with Pow Kee
that morning with the light, the door
was broken open

To the Court I don't know either

*I live on Government Street
Victoria - I am a merchant Tailor
I live in the same house where the shop
is, I live in the back of the shop*

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Street

situate on Government House
I had some Cloth and the several
goods belonging to a Factors shop
I kept the Trunk (now in Court,
it belongs to me, I kept it alongside
the bed, behind the door

I remember her losing the trunk :
(but not the day -) It was on a
Wednesday in the morning about
4 O'Clock = about 2 weeks ago -

Two Negroes stole the said box
away; the said trunk was ^{is produced} carried

There was the said Trunk
contained underclothes also
\$ 400 ⁰⁰ in a purse: I was
owner of the said purse and money

The purse was something
like Buck Skin: When it opened
the fastening was something like
bars The said purse had
a pouch inside or division inside
There was no mark on it It
was second hand - not new -
I had had it about two years,
but did not generally carry it about
in my pocket

I remember there was \$ 400 ⁰⁰
in Gold Coin in the purse -

no more nor no less I recognize
the said purse as mine (mark'd
A) The purse was in the
drawer of the Box -

The money consisted of
Some \$20 $\frac{00}{00}$ and \$10 $\frac{00}{00}$ Gold pieces

I to saw the Trunk in the
Cellar a little after 4 O'Clock, It
was then broken

When I went to bed the
box was not broken, and it was
lock'd ^{produced} I did not see
the axe, ^{produced} that time The
axe don't belong to me - I
never put the axe in the trunk
when I lock'd it the trunk
I saw 2 pairs of China Shoes
the same two pair as is now
produced in Cork - I saw
two Planks ^{were} off torn off - the
nails were broken - after
breakfast we followed certain
foot tracks, and found the axe
my house was lock'd on the night
in question

In Cork I went to bed a little after
11 O'Clock and I woke up a
little after 4 O'Clock. A Chinaman
named Ah King woke me up

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
Ah Keng struck a match saw
the back door open and then came and
woke me up. The trunk was in
my room. I don't lock the door
in my room. but I locked the back
door.

My bed room is mark'd on
the diagram "Exhibit F" by the
letter A. The door from which bed
room leads into the shop

B¹ is the back door, which
leads to another back door at the
head of the stair case call'd B².
it also leads to a back room
mark'd B

There is also a door in the collar
in the partition between my house
and the next house, call'd B³
which is the door that was broken
open

The place mark'd C is
where the 2 planks were torn off
F is where the trunk was found
and G is where the Chinese slippers
were found



I don't know the prisoners I never saw them except on the last Chinese New Year when Ah On came into the store about eleven months ago - I then saw Ah On only -

There was nothing taken from the box but the money, The under clothes were left in the box. ^{in the day time}

I counted the money the day before the said money was stolen there is a window in the front shop & people could look into my room from the side walk

This Deponent, *John McLeod*, upon his
oath deposeth, and saith as follows:

*I assisted in arresting both
prisoners. Officers Lindsay and Welch
were with me. We arrested them*

in a cabine off Cornwall Street
between 5 and 6 O'Clock of the Morn
ing of the 20th of December last
on a charge of stealing \$400⁰⁰

The prisoners were charged by
Paw Kee

The prisoner Ki Chu was on a
sort of Platform of the house off Cornwall
Street. He had on the same Chinese
Clothing as he has on now except

The other prisoner Ah On was
dressed as he is now except he had
on a pair Chinese Shoes which were
wet.

There was some clothes
hanging up in the room, but they
were Chinese Blouse as he wears
now ^{ah on} Ki Chu, said he didn't do it
The other prisoner ^{you produced} said nothing —

The box was in the same state
as when I examined it at Paw
Kee's Store Government on the morn
ing in question:

On inquiry
Paw Kee informed us "that he had
lost \$400⁰⁰ in Gold after the arrest
I ask'd Paw Kee the kind of money
he had lost and he said
there was \$40⁰⁰ in ten dollar

pieces, and the balance in \$20⁰⁰
dollar pieces all in Gold
